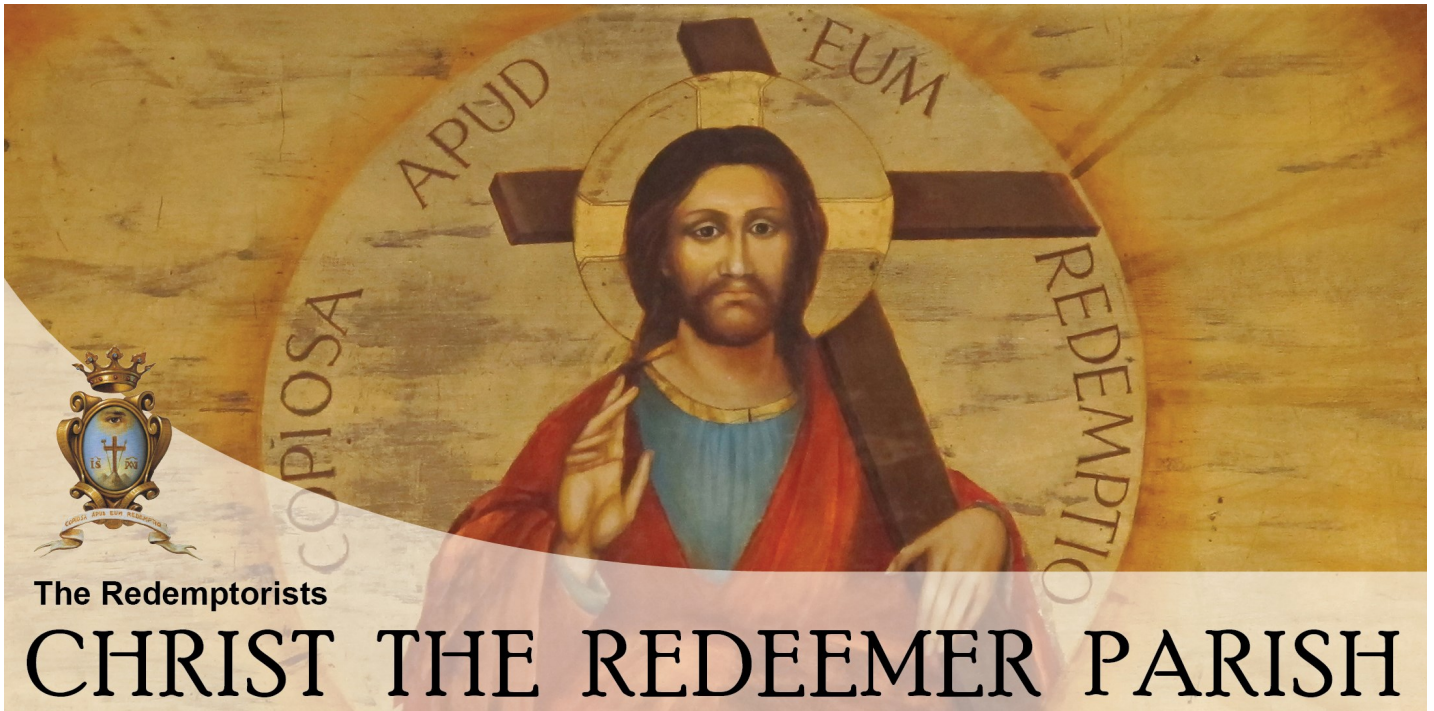

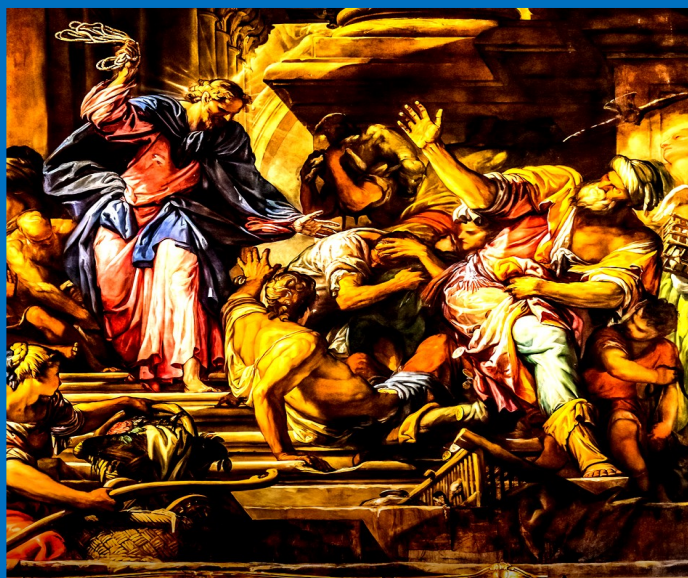

GOSPEL MEDITATION -

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

November 9, 2025

The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica John 2:13-22

When I was 22, I entered St. Peter’s Basilica for the first time. It floored me. I could hardly take it in, its grandeur, majestic arches, vibrant colors, and the light that danced through its high windows. Somehow, amidst such splendor, I felt an overwhelming sense of belonging, as if I had finally come home.

Jesus reorients how we Catholics see sacred buildings. In today’s Gospel he says, “Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up” (John 2:13-22). His riddle implies, shockingly, that his own body is now the fundamental dwelling place of God and humanity. The temple in Jerusalem has been superseded.

In our churches today — whether they mirror the basilica’s grandeur or embrace humble simplicity — we experience architectural symbols of Christ’s risen body. It is no accident we call them “churches”: they make visible in brick-and-mortar Christ’s body which is made up of the living stones we call Christians. Each church building, like St. John Lateran in Rome, or St. Peter’s, or any other, is meant to be a vibrant sign of Christ’s resurrected body. We should cherish and protect our churches as places where heaven touches earth, where we, as a community, are raised to the fullness of life in Christ.

MEDYTACJA NAD EWANGELIĄ – ZACHĘTA DO GŁĘBSZEGO ZROZUMIENIA PISMA ŚWIĘTEGO

9 listopada 2025

Poświęcenie Bazyliki Laterańskiej

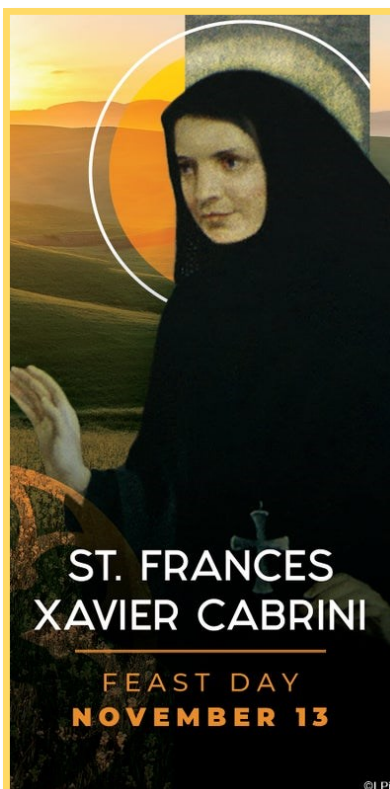
Ewangelia: Jan 2, 13–22

Kiedy miałem 22 lata, po raz pierwszy wszedłem do Bazyliki św. Piotra. Zamurowało mnie z wrażenia. Trudno mi było ogarnąć jej ogrom, majestatyczne sklepienia, żywe kolory i strumień światła przenikający duże okna. A jednak pośród tego przepychu poczułem głębokie poczucie przynależności — jakbym wrócił do domu.

Jezus nadaje nowe znaczenie temu, jak my, katolicy, postrzegamy budynki sakralne. W dzisiejszej Ewangelii mówi: „Zburzcie tę świątynię, a Ja w trzy dni wzniosę ją na nowo” (J 2, 13–22). Tą zagadką Jezus w zaskakujący sposób wskazuje, że Jego własne Ciało staje się teraz podstawowym miejscem zamieszkania Boga. Świątynia Jerozolimska została zastąpiona świątynią Ciała Jezusa.

W naszych współczesnych kościołach — czy to przypominających wspaniałość bazylik, czy też zachowujących prostotę — zauważyć możemy symbolikę Zmartwychwstałego Chrystusa. Nie bez powodu nazywamy je „kościołami”: w murach i kamieniach uobecniają one Ciało Chrystusa, które tworzą my chrześcijanie jako żywe kamienie. Każdy kościół, czy to Bazylika św. Jana na Lateranie, św. Piotra, czy jakiegokolwiek inny, jest żywym znakiem obecności Zmartwychwstałego Chrystusa. Powinniśmy więc z miłością i troską strzec naszych kościołów jako miejsc, gdzie Niebo dotyka Ziemi, a my — jako wspólnota — zostajemy wyniesieni do pełni życia w Chrystusie.

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini | November 13.

Biography St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (July 15, 1850 – December 22, 1917) was born in the village of Sant'Angelo Lodigiano, Italy. Young Frances dreamed of being a missionary. She was educated to be a teacher by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart, but was refused entry to the order due to her poor health. Instead, she worked as a teacher and administrator at an orphanage in Cadogno, Italy, run by the Sisters of Providence. In September 1877, she made her vows there and took the religious habit, adding Xavier to her name in honor of St. Francis Xavier. When the orphanage closed in 1880, she founded the Institute of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In 1887, St. Frances Xavier Cabrini sought an audience with Pope Leo XIII, to seek permission to go as missionaries to China. He famously told her to go "not to the East, but to the West," and in 1889 she and six other sisters departed for New York, to serve Italian immigrants in the United States. However, anti-Italian and anti-immigrant attitudes were prevalent at the time, even in the Church. When she arrived, the archbishop advised her to go back to Italy. Undeterred, she provided education and healthcare within the Italian Catholic immigrant community. At first, St. Frances Xavier Cabrini followed and served Italian immigrant populations, from New York to Chicago, and across the U.S., becoming a U.S. Citizen in 1909. Eventually she also founded institutions in Central and South America and Europe. Overall, she established 67 schools, hospitals, and orphanages. She was also known for her deep spirituality, often entering a trancelike state during the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. She died in her own Columbus Hospital in Chicago, Illinois. She was canonized in 1946 by Pope Pius XII, the first United States citizen to be canonized.

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

The “liturgy wars” are something of a hot topic in contemporary Catholic circles. Latin chant or guitar hymns? Communion on the tongue or in the hand? Chapel veils or bare heads? Surplice or alb? It’s giving me a headache just writing it all out.

I don’t mean to say that none of this matters. The worship of the Almighty God, especially in the context of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, is no trifling matter. It is good for people to be concerned about whether or not their worship is pleasing to God. I am happy that Catholics care enough about these things to have an opinion.

I’m not going to say where I fall on this spectrum of liturgical sensibility (the headache intensifies thinking of the emails I would get). And I won’t pretend it’s not something I feel passionate about, in my own way.

But too often I find myself sniffing dismissively at the “other camp,” the folks who are drawn to a different style or tradition. Too often I see them sniffing dismissively back to me. We are, both groups, obsessed with the form of a thing — so much so that we risk forgetting the function of it. And when I stop to think about it, I wonder if Jesus shouldn’t crack the whip at us all, the modern money-changers of the temple, who have allowed worship to become a transaction (I offer x sacrifice, I am rewarded with y feeling of fulfillment and satisfaction).

I look at the Gospel today, and I can see the purpose of the money-changers. It could be argued that, in a way, they were facilitating the laws of Moses, making possible the temple sacrifices stipulated by God.

But it matters why you do something, not just how you do it. What good is any act of worship, if at its conclusion we do not more closely resemble the One before whom we kneel?

Mass Etiquette:

Do not leave Mass early. You should stay to the end of the recession and the hymn that accompanies it. While there are from time to time exceptions to this (emergencies do happen), most who leave early don’t need to and ought not to.

Please stay through the final blessing.

Show up at least a few minutes early. Getting to Mass early allows you to pray and prepare yourself for Mass.

Feel free to kneel and pray before Mass!

Don’t chew gum in church. This breaks your fast, it is distracting, it is considered impolite in any formal setting especially Mass!

Fast before Mass. It is Church law that one fasts for at least 1 hour before receiving Holy Communion. Water and medicine can be consumed, of course. The purpose is to help us prepare to receive Jesus in the Eucharist.

Communion When receiving Holy Communion, once you have received the Sacred Host in your hand consume the Host immediately & directly in front of the Priest, Deacon or Eucharistic Minister.
